

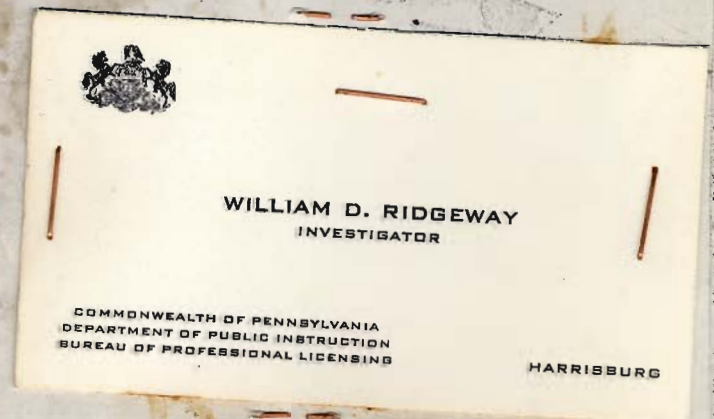



1,800 At Mortgage Burnings

A special program was interspersed into the dance activities that dominated the evening. An invocation was given by Eugene Burns, immediately after introductory remarks by John T. Butler. Mrs. Emile Robeson, coloratura soprano, gave a selection and then the highlight came in a speech by John M. Brown, superintendent of Station D.

Talks were also made by Joe H. Rainey, Herbert Miller and Harold Pilgrim, ex-president of the M. A.'s and one of the most militant and progressive executives in the history of the alliance.

1,000 See P. O. Employees Burn Mortgage at Dance

PHILADELPHIA — More than 1000 guests attended the mortgage burning and dance celebration by the Mutual Association of Postal Employees, at the Mercantile Hall, Tuesday.

John T. Butler introduced Clarence S. Clory, the president, who acted as master of ceremonies. Mr. Clory gave a resume of the work of the organization, which is twenty-three years old.

John Brown Speaks
John M. Brown, superintendent of Station D, spoke. Mr. Brown emphasized the importance of the organization.

Other speakers were: Harold L. Pilgrim, Herbert T. Miller, and Joseph H. Rainey, State boxing commissioner, each paying tribute to the association.

Raymond Burnett held the mortgage which was for \$12,500 while it was burned. The group is engaged in social, labor, philanthropic, and welfare activities.

Assets Above \$50,000
It has paid \$50,000 in sick and death benefits. Its assets are listed at above \$20,000, with a value of \$10,000 on the headquarters at Thirty-ninth and Brown Streets.

The association was organized in 1913, with Henry R. Smith as its first president. Today it is responsible for the unification of colored postal clerks and led the fight which resulted in appointment of a station superintendent.

Tribute was paid to Samuel Phillips, Edward Voorhees, and Joseph Oxford, deceased members.

The retired postal clerks were introduced and Samuel Thomas, the first secretary, told of the earlier difficulties of the organization with fewer opportunities than at present.

Mrs. Emily Robeson, accompanied by Miss M. Whittier, sang, and John T. Butler recited an original poem.

Postal Group Plans Mortgage Burning

PHILADELPHIA—The Mutual Association of Postal Employees Inc. will hold the formal mortgage burning of their new ten-thousand-dollar home and a celebration dance, January 26.

This organization, essentially one of labor, is dedicated to the protection of its members through sick and death benefits. Founded in 1913, and incorporated in 1923, the burning of the mortgage in 1937 marks another milestone in the historical progress of this great organization.

Secured Superintendent

The association is in no small

measure responsible for the unification of the postal clerk, and this organization played an active part in securing a superintendent at Station D.

The results of the association's valiant fight is constantly being reflected in its achievements. Outstanding evidence of this is the appearance of colored workers in postal and civil service positions formerly conceded to whites. 


